#### A message from our treasurer

Booth Co-Chairs Mike & Bridgette Bartley and Mike & Ann Ackerman extend our sincere thanks to all who worked the Strassenfest Booth. It takes the efforts of all able bodied club members for us to generate successful results. We had great fellowship and lots of fun serving Strassenfest guests our great German food offerings.

A special thanks to our 2021 day chairs: Kevin Bartley, Kevin Mullen, and Mike Jahn for your extra efforts to keep our booths running well.

Historically, in addition to our support through the November Auction meeting, our club provided a donation to students to assist with their requirement to earn funds to make the trip to Germany. Beginning a few years ago, we began encouraging these students to assist us in the staffing of our booths at Strassenfest. Thanks to our Jasper student workers and the 2 girls from Carmel who are working toward a Congressional Service Award by working festivals throughout the state for their efforts. These young workers were able to fill 24 of our shifts. Some stands on the square had to shut down early due to lack of volunteer workers. Other than closing the pastry booth at approx. 10 PM each evening and selling pastries from the brat booth, our club's use of students to supplement our ranks, allowed us to keep the booths operating full schedule. Each year, we had to spend money to patch our old pastry case to keep it going. In 2020, we were able to acquire a newer pastry case. Thank you to Jim Corn for building and painting the filler panel for the Pastry Booth to fit to our new cold case profile.

Booth setup: Thanks to the good sized group who came out on Tuesday to help with the booth setup and decorating and to the smaller contingency on Sunday afternoon for tear down.

As many are aware, lead times for buying almost everything is now longer and supply of all product including foods are very tight. Our orders had to be in early with no reorders possible on most of the items that we sell at our booth. Our goal was to maintain historical order volumes on virtually all items while increasing order volumes on our core items, we were fortunate enough to basically sell out of all foods. With Bridgette's efforts to order the right amount of product, we avoided the need for bulk food discounted sales of unused product that would have negatively impacted margins. Thanks Bridgette for the planning and coordination that goes into this.

An interesting fact is the continued shift on percentage of sales by night. Historically, the sales were about 20% on Thursday, 30% on Friday, and 50% on Saturday. 2021 sales were 25.75% Thursday, 4.75% Friday Lunch, 27% Friday evening, and 42.5% Saturday. I believe that this shift of sales was largely influenced by efforts to increase the number of German Heritage events on Thursday evening bringing out larger crowds. Thank you Laura and Paul Grammer for leading the efforts to keep Strassenfest rooted in its German Heritage

2018 and 2019 were both strong sales years, and 2021 was even better. Total sales were \$46,872

Log Sawing contest is one of the oldest continually operated events at the Strassenfest, and is part of our German Heritage efforts. Shout out to Dan Wehr and the crew for working the Log Sawing Event. On Monday evening 08-02, a crew of Dan Wehr, Noah Whalen, Paul Siegel, and Fred Roeder prepped the saws and prenotched the logs for the contest. A shout out to Werner Sawmill and Fred Roeder for assisting with lumber, saw buck, saws, and manpower.

After 40 years, Dan who has been organizing and serving as MC for this event will be turning over the reins. Transition plans for keeping this event going are to have our club President (Host/Hostess) to head this event. Birnie Jeffries has also volunteered to serve as MC for us to have a core group to get started. As time goes on, past presidents who have been involved will be able to be on stage to help and keep this event going for years to come.

Linda Schroering, the person who ran the Sheephead tourney passed in 2021. Mike and Phyllis Ackerman ran the tourney in 2021. There is a need for someone to take over the Sheephead tourney for Saturday at Noon for future years. Please contact Mike Ackerman to volunteer for this service.

Thanks again to all who helped. For our club to remain financially viable, it is important that members are available the week of Strassenfest to help. #### Artisan and Craftsman Exchange Update

The details and planning for the Artisan and Craftsman exchange continue between the Jasper Partnership Commission in cooperation with Sister Cities of Jasper, with support from the Mayor's offices of both Jasper and Pfaffenweiler.

Eight applications were submitted by individuals interested in the exchange from Jasper. A selection committee of members from the Partnership Commission, Sister Cities of Jasper, and the Jasper Arts Commission was formed to select the individuals to travel to Pfaffenweiler. The committee selected three individuals to travel to represent Jasper in November:

The three selected individuals will travel to Pfaffenweiler from the middle of November to the beginning of December to demonstrate, produce, and sell their products at various locations and at the "open air market" in Pfaffenweiler to be held November 27, 2021.

We are still hopeful that at least one individual from Pfaffenweiler will be able to travel to Jasper in November 2021. Plans are pending based upon the CDC and U.S.travel guidelines. We hope to know more later in the coming month.



#### Exchange favors good return

Patricia Keller used to go to work at the German American Bank in the mornings and buy a soft drink.

She would let the drink sit until became warm. Then she drank it. Warm soda was what she was used to back home in Pfaffenweiler, Germany.

Keller was the eighth person from Pfaffenweiler to participate in a work exchange program as part of Jasper Sister City program with the German town.

Keller spent six months working at GAB. Her internship ended March 29.

Jasper and Pfaffenweiler have been sister cities since 1985. Besides work exchange program, there is also a student exchange of high-schoolers, and every two or three years groups of people from Jasper or Pfaffenweiler make a trip to the other destination.

Keller, 20, is studying in accounting and marketing in Germany. She wanted the hands-on experience of working in the States.

"It was always a dream for me to come to the United States," Keller said.

When she arrived in Jasper she did have some things to adjust to: a new country, a host family and working every day. Keller said she enjoyed all aspects of her stay.

"I really would have stayed longer if I could," Keller said.

Her co-workers at German American Bank wished she could stay too.

"I'm really sorry to see her go," said Tonya Brothers-Bridge, a senior vice president and director of marketing and training, who was Keller's supervisor at the bank.

"She was willing to do everything we asked," Brothers-Bridge said. "She taught us a lot about the German culture and the language."

Keller said her English improved during her stay here.

She said she felt comfortable at GAB and in Jasper from the beginning.

Keller stayed with David and Janet Kluemper in Jasper. She was the third work exchange participant they have hosted.

"We enjoyed having younger people here to have the experience," Janet Kluemper said.

Matt Hilger, president of the Jasper partnership commission, was the first person to participate in the work exchange. He has lived in Jasper since 1987.

"If you look at today's world, the world is very close," Hilger said. He said having international experience is looked upon very favorably by European companies.

Hilger also said the work exchange program makes it easier for young people to come here.

"For us (in Pfaffenweiler) to have the sister city is kind of a safe haven," Hilger said.

Parents in Germany feel comfortable with letting their kids make the trip to Jasper, he said.

Brothers-Bridge said that when the possibility of getting an employee through the work exchange program came up, the bank quickly took up the opportunity.

"Absolutely, to support the program and because of our interest in German heritage," Brothers-Bridge said.

Thursday, employees of GAB surprised Keller with a going-away party.

Keller thought she was going into the office to sign paperwork.

Nearly 50 bank employees, members of the Jasper DeutscherVerein and Keller's parents, who had spent the week in Jasper, were there to show their appreciation for Keller's work.

"I thought something was going on. To sign paperwork at 8 in the morning seemed odd, she said.

She was greeted with hugs, gifts, and a cake decorated with both the German and American flags.

"Thanks again for the opportunity," she said.
